Understanding Ransomeware

Ransomeware a real threat! State and local governments, law enforcement agencies, small businesses and large businesses are just some of the entities impacted recently by ransomware, an insidious type of malware that encrypts, or locks, valuable digital files and demands a ransom to release them.

In a ransomware attack, victims upon seeing an e-mail addressed to them will open it and may click on an attachment that appears legitimate, like an invoice or an electronic fax, but which actually contains the malicious ransomware code. Or the e-mail might contain a legitimate-looking URL, but when a victim clicks on it, they are directed to a website that infects their computer with malicious software.

Once the infection is present, the malware begins encrypting files and folders on local drives, any attached drives, backup drives, and potentially other computers on the same network that the victim computer is attached to. Users and organizations are generally not aware they have been infected until they can no longer access their data. In some cases the attack is immediate with messages advising them of the attack and demands for a ransom payment in exchange for a decryption key. These messages include instructions on how to pay the ransom, usually with bitcoins because of the anonymity this virtual currency provides.

Although Police and City IT work behind the scenes to protect our networks we still need you! Help protect the City, Department networks and your personal computers from these types of attacks. Be aware and be cautious; avoid clicking on embedded links, or email attachments found in unknown senders or unverified of emails and create backup files of your most important data files just in case you become a victim.

Infected Computer - What To Do

- Disconnect network cable or WIFI from device.
- Power off computer-device immediately.
- Disconnect any external storage or backup device.
- Contact IT Support immediately.

Password Enforcement

How difficult is your password?

Make it unique, but simple:

- Passwords should contain12-characters or more.
- Avoid common names, places, and words.
- Take a sentence and turn it into a password.
- Mix it up. Use variations on capitalization, spelling numbers, special characters and punctuation. After creating your super-secure password, the most important step remaining:
- Never reuse the same password.
- Never tape the password to your computer.
- Never share your password.



Tablet Tips

MUPDATE Process-Coming soon! Effective July 1st. Police and City IT have made improvements to the tablet OSSI MUPDATE proticol. User will no longer be to manually MUPDATE their required devices weekly; this service will occur automatically weekly, not requiring users intervention.

Care & Security - Please make sure, you remove your tablet from your vehicle at the end of shift to avoid potential theft and avoid the summer heat. Leaving the tablet in the car during the summer could expose it to excessive and prolonged temperatures of 120', even tough tablets have a breaking point.

If you need support with software and hardware technology support please submit a written request to the Information Technology Unit. The written request should be entered through the City I.T. tracking software known as Footprints. This software is located on your desktop and only requires a few minutes of your time to describe your issue. The request will be prioritized and resolved by the Department's I.T. staff. When accessing the Footprints application you must use your network ID that includes your last name and first initial typically, and your network password. If you don't know your network userID and password please make an appointment with David or Alfonso to review you network credentials and if needed a tutorial review the Footprints application.
